

A Case for Text Complexity

A pedagogy focused only on "higher-order" or "critical" thinking is insufficient to ensure that students are ready for college and careers. What students can read, in terms of its complexity, is at least as important as what they can do with what they read.

A number of studies have shown a declining complexity of texts students are given in K-12 reading texts and in independent reading. To help redress this situation, the Common Core Standards define a three-part model for determining how easy or difficult a text is to read, as well as grade-by-grade specifications for increasing text complexity in successive years of schooling (see Reading Standard 10). The model

- Qualitative dimensions of text complexity—i.e., purpose, structure, language conventionality, and knowledge demands
- Quantitative dimensions of text complexity—i.e., word length and frequency, sentence length, and text cohesion
- Reader and text considerations—i.e., variables specific to particular readers and to particular tasks must also be considered when determining whether a text is appropriate to a given student.

The Standards presume that all three elements will come into play when text complexity and appropriateness are determined by teachers using their professional judgment, experiences, and knowledge of their students and the subject.




Roland Smith, **Keynote Speaker**


